The Island Community Theatre's first production of the season, "Everybody Loves Opal," opens tonight at 8 p.m. in Lee Auditorium. Another performance will be presented tomorrow night at the same time. Admission is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students.

SUCCESSOR TO JAMES FLANNERY APPOINTED

Governor H. Rex Lee today announced that Mundy Johnston, of Tucson, Arizona, will succeed James Flannery as assistant to the Governor. Mr. and Mrs. Johnston will arrive here around January 15.

Governor Lee said Johnston has many years of banking experience and has been board chairman of the Bank of Tucson for the past several years. He will retire from that position January 1.

As assistant to the Governor, Johnston will be in charge of all economic development in the Territory. "I am exceptionally pleased we are able to obtain this man," Governor Lee said today. "His services will be especially valuable to this Territory because it now stands on the threshold of large-scale economic development."

The Johnstons spent about a month in American Samoa four years ago. They grew fond of the islands and have maintained close touch with Governor Lee ever since.

Mrs. Johnson is a specialist in education and has taught at the University of Arizona. She and her husband have been active in civic affairs and the promotion of tourism in southern Arizona.

FORMER GOVERNOR OF FLORIDA DUE HERE MONDAY

Farris Bryant, the former governor of Florida and presently director of the U.S. Office of Emergency Planning, will arrive in American Samoa from Sydney Monday morning, Governor Lee said today.

Bryant is a member of the President's Cabinet Task Force on Travel. He is also a member of the National Security Council and attends all Cabinet meetings with the President's staff.

As head of the Office of Emergency Planning, he is in charge of disaster relief, including hurricane relief in American Samoa. During his visit here he will inspect all of the hurricane damage projects, especially the Hurricane Housing Program.

Bryant and his wife will arrive here after having attended a NATO conference in Europe and traveled through the Middle and Far East to Australia. They will be met at Pago Pago International Airport by Governor Lee, leading Samoan chiefs, and a police honor guard.
