NO MORE SURFACE MAIL DUE BEFORE CHRISTMAS

Postmistress Jane Uhrle said today that no more freighters will arrive here with surface mail between now and Christmas. Packages that haven't been received but which are expected will not arrive until after Christmas unless they are coming by air mail, she said.

Mrs. Uhrle's husband, Port Director Fred Uhrle, said the next mail-carrying vessel due here from the mainland U.S. is the Matson freighter Ventura, scheduled to arrive December 27. The next ship after that will probably be the Graziella Zeta, arriving January 5.

Mrs. Uhrle said that all 610 bags of mail that came aboard the Matson freighter Sierra a couple of weeks ago have been processed. However, the number of incoming air mail packages has risen sharply. About 120 sacks of air mail arrived on Sunday's Pan Am plane, she said.

FARRIS BRYANT, GOVERNOR LEE INSPECT HURRICANE RELIEF PROJECTS

Governor Lee, Public Works Director Al Pratte, and Farris Bryant, director of the Office of Emergency Planning in Washington, D.C., inspected hurricane relief projects in the western district of Tutuila yesterday. Today they are inspecting schools and hurricane houses in the eastern district.

An 'ava ceremony was held in honor of Mr. Bryant this afternoon at 2 p.m. in the ceremonial fale at the airport. Mr. and Mrs. Bryant, who arrived here Monday from Europe via the Far East and Australia, are scheduled to fly to Hawaii on tomorrow morning's Pan Am plane.

Governor Lee And Samoan Leaders To Meet In Legislature Tomorrow

Governor Lee will meet at 10 a.m. tomorrow in the Legislative Conference Room with all members of the Senate, the House of Representatives, all district governors and county chiefs: It is believed that the Governor will discuss his recent trip to Washington.

OBEY THE SCHOOL BUS LAW

Commissioner of Public Safety Dewey Allen again reminds the public of American Samoa's new school bus law, which requires all motorists to halt when coming upon a school but that has stopped to let off or take on children.

Allen emphasized that all motor vehicles -- those behind and those approaching -- must stop when a school bus stops. The purpose of the law is to protect any child who might dart out into the highway after debarking from a bus.

HONOLULU --- The Democratic chairman of Hawaii's Maui County, Eddie Tam, died this morning at Maui Memorial Hospital. He was 67.

Tam had held the top county position for the past 18 years. A colorful political figure, he was known as the "Mayor of Maui."

Lanny Morisaki, chairman of the Maui County Board of Supervisors, has been named acting chairman of Maui County until the end of the year.

SATELLITES IN THE NEWS

HONOLULU -- Satellites figure in a possible conversation between a man in Honolulu and his boss in an airplane high above the midwest. They also figure in the possibility of live education television for Hawaii.

The conversation will be between the local general manager for American Airlines, Frank Kirchenberg, and W. T. Seawell, American Airlines vice-president in a jet over the Kansas area. The satellite that will relay the conversation is the Applications Technology Satellite -- high above tiny Christmas Island in the Pacific.

The other satellite in the news today is one proposed by the Ford Foundation. The foundation is pushing for a satellite that would relay nation-wide educational television by 1967. Nation-wide means Hawaii too.

FLUORIDATION IS CONTROVERSIAL ISSUE IN HAWAII -- AGAIN

HONOLULU -- A massive meeting to publicly discuss the pros and cons of fluoridation will be held at the Honolulu International Center tonight. The city council has called the unusual meeting because of the great amount of interest shown in the controversial measure. Individuals will be allowed to speak from the floor at the 7:30 p.m. hearing.

Groups representing both sides will speak, but City Council Chairman Herman Lemke says no banners or placards will be allowed. Sometime during the hearing the Citizens For Pure Water Committee will present a petition which they say has 30,000 names on it and which expresses disapproval of the measure.
