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GOVERNOR LEE, BERNARD HOLLANDER SUMMONED TO WASHINGTON

Governor Lee and Bernard Hollander, American Samoa's consultant in the trans-Pacific route case, left for Washington early today to consult further with Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall on the route case and other territorial matters. They had planned to leave about January 1 but were summoned late last week.

Both Governor Lee and Hollander will be in Honolulu January 12 when the Civil Aeronautics Board begins what will probably be several months of hearings on the need for new airline routes in the Pacific. American Samoa has hired Hollander and an eastern U.S. firm to represent its interests in the case. (Several airlines have filed applications requesting to fly through or within the area of American Samoa.)

Governor Lee also will attend Interior Department hearings to watch assembly quotas in U.S. territories. In addition, the Governor will assist the Interior Department in the preparation of American Samoa's budget to Congress.

Governor Lee said he hopes to return to American Samoa around mid-January.

ATHLETES WILL RETURN FROM NEW CALEDONIA TOMORROW

American Samoa athletes who participated in the Second South Pacific Games in New Caledonia will return late tomorrow in separate Polynesian Air Lines planes.

They will be greeted by Acting Governor Owen S. Aspinall, leading Samoan chiefs and the Aua Band. The first plane arrives at 4:45 p.m. and the second arrives at 8:45 p.m. The public is invited to participate in the welcome.

Thirty-five athletes and four coaches represented American Samoa at the games. The volleyball and basketball teams were defeated early in the competition, but four boxers won silver medals and one boxer won a bronze medal. The games started December 8 (New Caledonia time) and ended this past weekend. The host country of New Caledonia won the most medals.

The Third South Pacific Games -- scheduled for 1969 -- will be held in Papua-New Guinea.

SILENT THIEF STEALS MONEY FROM UTULEI APARTMENT

A silent thief entered the unlocked back door of an Utulei apartment Friday night and stole \$18, a purse and a checkbook while the occupants of the apartment were watching television.

Commissioner of Public Safety Dewey Allen said the purse -- which contained the money and the checkbook -- was laying on a shelf near the back door. The apartment's occupants said they heard nothing that would indicate someone had entered the apartment.

That same evening a screen was slashed at a home in Utulei, but nothing was believed to be missing.

HAWAII ANTI-FLUORIDATIONISTS PICKET NEWSPAPERS

HONOLULU, -- A spokesman for an anti-fluoridation group called the "Pure Water Association" has announced plans to picket outside the Hawaii Newspaper Association building in downtown Honolulu.

The spokesman said the picketing would begin at noon and will continue as long as there is public support for the demonstration.

The demonstration was organized as a protest to the stand taken by the Advertiser and Star-Bulletin in favor of fluoridation.

Asked how many persons are expected to participate in the demonstration, the spokesman said -- "your guess is as good as mine."
