TULA MAN SHOT, KILLED DURING BEER-DRINKING SESSION

A 40-year-old Tula man, Mose Iuli, died in the Hospital of American Samoa early this morning reportedly about two and a half hours after he was shot in the head during a beer-drinking session. Police are holding a 31-year-old man, also from Tula but formerly of Nu'uuli, as a suspect.

Police were told that the victim and three other men were drinking beer -- "a lot of it," according to Commissioner of Public Safety Dewey Allen -- last night in a fale in Tula. During the idle conversation of the beer-drinking session, the suspect reportedly was kidded about his inaccuracy with a rifle.

Iuli was shot in the head by a .22 caliber rifle that Allen said "has been around for some years." A bus delivered the wounded man to the hospital at 11:45 p.m. He died at 12:35 a.m.

Investigation is continuing.

The last homicide in American Samoa occurred in April, 1964.

KOREAN FISHERMAN KILLED AT SEA

The body of a 19-year-old Korean fisherman was returned to Pago Pago early this week about 11 days after he was struck on the head by a chunk of packing ice.

The victim was identified as Chung Won Sun. He was buried yesterday on a plot of land near Futiga owned by High Chief Asuemu Fuimaono, personnel officer of the Star Kist cannery, and High Chief Ulufale, Fuimaono's brother. Three other Asian fishermen who have died in American Samoa are also buried there.

Commissioner of Public Safety Dewey Allen was told the incident happened on December 27 as the victim's fishing boat, the Tong Wha No. 1, was several hundred miles from Tutuila. The victim was working in the ice hold of the boat while other crewmen were moving ice that is used in packing the newly-caught fish. A large quantity of the ice fell upon Sun, and it is believed he died instantly.

Fuimaono said the boat immediately headed back to Pago Pago and arrived Monday. He also reported that the victim had been in American Samoa only four months before he was killed; this was his third trip to sea.

WASHINGTON-BOUND SAMOA MURAL WILL BE DISPLAYED TOMORROW

An eight-foot by eight-foot Samoan mural painted for permanent display outside the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, in Washington, will be displayed on the front porch of the Court House tomorrow morning before being shipped to the nation's capital next week.

The mural was painted by three Samoan students at Fia Iloa High School as Samoa's contribution to the "Tom Sawyer Project" of the Performing Arts Center. The project involves a fence, circling the Kennedy Memorial Building, made of 8x8 murals from each state and territory of the U.S.

The rules of the project are that the mural or panel contributed by each state and territory must be painted by students between the ages of nine and 15.

They must use exterior enamel paint of only black and white and the three primary colors -- red, blue and yellow. However, the students may create any other shade of color by mixing these basic colors.

Each contribution is supposed to depict a scene representative of the students' state or territory. The Samoa mural is an 'ava ceremony, complete with a talking chief, a taupou, 'ava bowl, and -- in the background -- mountains, the sea, coconut trees and fales. The artists were Jack Ripley, Howard Aga, and Sekuini Seva'aetasi -- all students in the Fia Iloa art class of Mrs. Fern Harold, who was the advisor to the local project.

PAN AM RELEASES NEW COLOR BROCHURE ON SAMOA

A new travel brochure on Samoa, featuring several color photographs, has just been released by Pan American World Airways.

Don Pegues, district traffic sales manager for Pan Am in Pago Pago, received a few samples of the new brochures Tuesday. He is expecting a larger shipment in about a month, but he pointed out that the brochures were made for distribution in places outside of Samoa. They are being sent to Pan Am's 129 sales offices around the world and to several hundred travel agencies.

The photographs in the brochure, printed in rich colors, dwell primarily on the Pago Pago Intercontinental Hotel. They show views of the pool, the cocktail lounge and snack bar, the entire hotel with the bay and Rainmaker Mountain in the background, and hotel employees doing Samoan dances.

The text describes what to see and do in American and Western Samoa, and one page tells about the legend of the shark and the turtle.

FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP TO BE SHOWN ON KVZK-TV TOMORROW AFTERNOON
