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FORMER NU'UULI RESIDENT CHARGED WITH DEATH OF TULA MAN

La'au Fanene, 29, formerly of Nu'uuli but recently of Tula, was arrested last night and charged with first-degree murder in the death of 40-year-old Mose Iuli, of Tula, last Thursday night.

Iuli died in the Hospital of American Samoa few hours after a shooting incident that police said took place in a Tula fale. Iuli was shot in the head by an old .22 caliber rifle, according to Commissioner of Public Safety Dewey Allen.

NEW ASSISTANT TO GOVERNOR LEE ARRIVES

Mundey Johnston, former chairman of the board of the Bank of Tucson (Arizona), arrived here Sunday to begin a two-year assignment as special assistant to Governor Lee. His duties will center around economic development in American Samoa.

Johnston is a native of Ohio but has lived in Tucson since 1925. He has been a banker for the last 30 years, and he was board chairman of the Bank of Tucson for four years prior to his retirement December 31.

His wife, Betty, holds a doctor of education degree and is an associate professor of education at the University of Arizona, in Tucson. She will finish the current academic semester and arrive here February 19.

The Johnstons will live in Utulei.

"PARKING PROBLEM" IN THE BAY?

After a week with no ship traffic, Port Administrator Fred Uhrle reports a potential traffic jam this week.

Yesterday morning the Graziella Zeta arrived for her normal stay of several days. The Sonoma arrived in the early morning hours and was moored to the Standard Oil Dock because the Graziella Zeta was already occupying the main dock.

The Tofua is expected to arrive tomorrow morning. The Thorsgaard is due around noon Friday, and the Daisen Maru has tentatively scheduled her arrival for Friday also.

Urhle admitted that the unusual number of ships posed some problem in finding docking space for all, but he felt sure that "something can be worked out."

AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT EMPLOYEES TO TAKE COURSES AT EAST-WEST CENTER

Two employees of the Department of Agriculture are scheduled to take courses at the East-West Center in Honolulu.

Maijo Nomura Glenister, main office supervisor for the department, left a week ago to attend a six-month refresher course in business education and office management. Senetenari Porotesano, of Aoloau, a quarantine inspector, will leave late this month to attend a three-month course in animal quarantine techniques and procedures.

John M. Hanlin, TV project coordinator for the Agriculture Department, said Porotesano's enrollment in the quarantine course recognizes the need for more knowledge in American Samoa about animal quarantine procedures.

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Agriculture Department Employees To Take Courses At East-West Center (cont'd)

"Like Hawaii, our islands do not at present have rabies that could be introduced by pet dogs and cats; nor do we have hoof and mouth disease, nor certain other animal diseases. Quarantine officers need training of a practical type that will enable them to make thorough inspects of imported poultry, game birds, game animals, domestic animals such as dogs and cats, cattle, horses and other animals, and inspections of such exported items as animal hides.

This training program in animal quarantine procedures will provide a means of meeting the need for more knowledge about this important subject. It is based on the concept of on-the-job training.

"The participants will be assigned to work at the State of Hawaii Animal Quarantine Station in Honolulu and will get experience also in the inspection of incoming planes and ships. Staff members of the Inspection and Quarantine Branch of the State of Hawaii Department of Agriculture, Division of Animal Industry, will serve as resource persons, teachers and/or trainers."

CONGRESSMAN VOWS TO PUSH GUAM GOVERNOR BILL

WASHINGTON -- Chairman Henry M. Jackson of the Senate Interior Committee today pledged quick action this session on legislation to permit popular election of the governor of Guam.

The measure died in the last session of Congress after different versions passed both the House and Senate.

Jackson, in a letter to Washington delegate Antonio B. Won Pat of Guam, said the bill would be "one of the first items on our agenda." Jackson also said he was expecting the Interior Department to submit legislation to increase Guam's general obligation bonding authority and to provide an increased authorization for the Guam Rehabilitation Act of 1963.

NEW PACIFIC AIR FORCE COMMANDER

GONOLULU -- General John Ryan, commander of the Strategic Air Command, has been appointed commander of the Pacific Air Force at Hickam Air Force Base in Hawaii.

The 51-year-old Ryan will replace General Hunter Harris, who is retiring. Change of command ceremonies are scheduled for January 31 at Hickam.

General Ryan is a 1938 graduate of West Point. During World War II he flew 58 missions for a total of 340 combat hours.
