ASO TOFI, IANUARI 19, 1967NEW AIR FORCE CAFETERIA WILL BE OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

A new restaurant facility -- a cafeteria -- will open tomorrow night at the Tafuna Air Force Housing Complex. Although it was constructed to provide meals for military personnel based here, it will be open to the public three meals a day on a reservation basis.

Meals will be served cafeteria style according to the following schedule: breakfast from 7 a.m. to 8:30 a.m.; lunch from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.; and dinner from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Reservations -- at least four hours in advance -- may be made by calling the cafeteria at 845 or the Department of Administrative Services at 2355. Leonard Yandall, deputy director of administrative services, said service will not be available to those who have not made reservations.

Yandall also said the public is encouraged to wear decent clothing when utilizing the cafeteria. No meals will be served to those who come with collarless shirts or bathing outfits, he said.

The opening of the new cafeteria means that starting also tomorrow night, the airport restaurant will discontinue serving full meals. The operation of the airport restaurant will be reduced to providing only coffee, sandwiches and light refreshments daily.

The new Tafuna Air Force Housing Complex consists of three sections: Building A, housing for up to 190 military personnel assigned here on a short-term basis; Building B, housing for up to 30 military personnel assigned here on a permanent basis (presently, the 23 personnel of Air Force Detachment 433); and Building C, the dining hall.

20-YEAR SERVICE CERTIFICATE AWARDED TO LEONE MIDKIFF TEACHER

Mrs. Nei A. Taue'etia, a Level 4 teacher at Leone-Midkiff Elementary Consolidated School, was honored at the Department of Education yesterday for 20 years of service to education in American Samoa.

Mrs. Taue'etia started her teaching career at the Leone Brothers' School in 1941. In 1942 she was a teacher-principal at Leone Primary School, and from 1947 to 1949 she was an assistant principal at Leone Junior High School.

She held part-time teaching positions from 1949 to 1957, when she became assistant principal of Tualatai Village School. She held several other principal positions until she came to Leone-Midkiff School in 1962. In July and August of 1965 she was an observer at the Elementary School Principals' Workshop that was held at the University of Hawaii.

Mrs. Taue'etia, who lives in Taputimu, was presented a Certificate of Service yesterday by Dr. John Harold, director of education, Mrs. Mildred Cobb, assistant director for elementary schools, and Stephen Feit, principal of Leone-Midkiff Consolidated School.

HEART DISEASE IS SECOND MOST COMMON KILLER IN WESTERN SAMOA

APIA, Western Samoa -- Heart disease is the second most common killer in Western Samoa, according to a recent story in the Western Samoa newspaper, Samoa Bulletin.

The story quotes Dr. Tautasi Leota of the Western Samoa Health Department. According to a survey made by the Health Department on the "Twelve Most Common Causes of Death from 1962 through 1965," the biggest killer was influenza and bronchitis. The next four most common killers were heart diseases, accidents (all forms), infections of newborns and diseases of early infancy, and the diseases of gastritis, duodenitis, enteritis and colitis.

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Diseases of the heart was responsible for 28 of the 153 reported deaths in American Samoa in 1966, according to Harold Bernshock, hospital administrator. This made heart diseases the No.1 killer in American Samoa last year.

The next four most common causes of death were: senility or deaths resulting from ill-defined or unknown causes (19); infancy diseases (16); cancer (13); pneumonia, including influenza and bronchitis (11); and accidents, all forms (10).

GOVERNOR LEE WILL TESTIFY AT TRANS-PACIFIC HEARINGS IN  
HONOLULU NEXT MONTH

HONOLULU --- Governor H. Rex Lee of American Samoa is one of several government officials scheduled to testify in the opening round of hearings in the Trans-Pacific Route Case in Honolulu February 15, according to the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB).

Eighteen airlines are competing for new or expanded routes to Hawaii, the South Pacific and the Orient in the route investigation, believed to be the largest ever undertaken by the CAB.

Appearances at the hearings have also been scheduled with Hawaii Governor John A. Burns, Honolulu Mayor Neal S. Blaisdell, High Commissioner William Norwood of the Trust Territory, Governor Manuel Guerrero of Guam, and representatives of Aloha and Hawaiian Airlines, the cities of Dallas, Fort Worth, Detroit, Fairbanks, Las Vegas, Long Beach, Oakland, Portland, Phoenix, San Antonio, San Francisco and St. Louis, the states of Alaska, Oregon and Washington, and the Post Office Department.
