KVZK-TV TO BROADCAST EVENING PROGRAMS ON TWO CHANNELS

Starting next Monday, KVZK-TV will broadcast evening programs on two channels. The change in programming will be initiated on a two-week trial basis, and it will involve the addition of four new programs to the KVZK-TV schedule.

The new programs are: The Gary Moore Show, a variety music and comedy program; Hennessey, a situation comedy show about the adventures of a young Navy doctor; Expedition, an award-winning travel adventure series; and Wide World of Sports, a 1½-hour program featuring sporting events from around the world.

Tivis Wicker, supervisor of adult education and evening programming, said broadcasting on two channels (2 and 4) will be featured Monday through Friday starting at 7 p.m. On Saturday evenings, the regular one-channel schedule will remain in effect on Channel 2.

The purpose of the two-channel programming, he said, is to allow for greater flexibility in programming, to allow viewers a choice of evening programs, and to make possible the addition of new programs. The evening news program (Tala 'Ese 'Ese) will be split into two 15-minute programs -- one in English and the other in Samoan. The English version will be seen at 7 p.m. on Channel 4 and the Samoan version will be seen at 7:15 p.m. on Channel 2.

There will be at least two entertainment-type programs on each channel every evening. All the entertainment-type programs will be shown twice each week--once on each channel -- with the exception of McHale's Navy and the Rosemary Clooney Show. These programs will be seen only on Channel 2 on Wednesday nights.

The public is invited to express its reaction to the dual programming to the Department of Education.

KVZK-TV TO SHOW VIDEO TAPE ON N.F.L. PRO BOWL GAME THURSDAY NIGHT

A video tape of the National Football League Pro Bowl game that was played in Los Angeles January 22 will be shown on KVZK-TV Thursday night, pre-empting all other evening programs except the news.

The news (Tala 'Ese 'Ese) will begin evening programming at 7 p.m., and the Pro Bowl game -- between the East and the West All-Stars -- will begin at 7:30 p.m.

KING AND QUEEN OF TONGA WELCOMED BY CROWD OF 300

A crowd of about 300 welcomed the king and queen of Tonga late yesterday as they arrived at the main dock at 6:30 p.m. aboard the Tongan ship Hifofua. The ship was about two and a half hours late, but most of the crowd remained to see the arrival of King Taufa'ahau Tupou IV and Queen Halaevalu.

The king and queen were greeted by Acting Governor Owen S. Aspinall and his wife, Taotafa, a police honor guard, and several Samoan chiefs. The arrival ceremonies were recorded on tape for broadcast in Tonga, as requested by a Tonga radio station.

The king and queen will leave early tomorrow morning on the Pan Am plane bound for Honolulu. There, they will be greeted by Hawaii Governor and Mrs. John A. Burns and Tongans in Hawaii. They will walk on a tapa carpet to the Oriental Garden of Honolulu International Airport, where a feast will take

Today is the last day for legally driving with a 1966 driver's license. Starting tomorrow, all motorists must have a new three-year driver's license.

Dewey Allen, commissioner of public safety, says licenses applied for yesterday and today will be ready in the next few days. Starting next week police will not accept the 1966 license as a valid driver's license.

ROCKS REQUIRED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works is still in need of a considerable quantity of large rocks, approximately two feet in diameter or larger. Anyone who has such rock on his land and is willing to have it removed should come to the Department of Public Works Office in Fagatogo or phone 2502 or 2503.

The Department of Public Works is primarily concerned with the area from Pago Pago to Alofau. The source of rock should be readily accessible to construction equipment, the Department requests.

The government will, if conditions and quantity of rock warrants, level and/or grade the area from which the rock is removed. No payment will be made for rock removed.

EASTERN DISTRICT POWER SHUTDOWN NEXT SUNDAY

There will be a power shutdown in the Eastern District from 5 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday so three rotted power poles can be replaced.

The affected area includes Mt. Alava, the canneries, the Marine Railway, and from the power plant eastward.
