## TWO GOVERNMENT SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS RETURN

Two government scholarship recipients have returned to American Samoa to apply their newly-learned skills here. They are Miss Faufau S. Fa'apouli of Fagatogo and Leslie Anderson of Nu'uuli.

Miss Fa'apouli, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fa'apouli of Fitiuta, Manu'a, went to the U.S. in 1960 to attend Manchester College in North Manchester, Indiana. She graduated in 1964 and took an additional year of leave.

Miss Fa'apouli graduated from Feleti Teacher Training School here in 1955 and she taught elementary school until leaving for the U.S. in 1960. She returned to American Samoa on February 26 and is now teaching at the Utulei campus of the High School of American Samoa.

Anderson, son of Mrs. Marie Forsell of Nu'uuli, just completed a year and three months of training at the Appliance and X-Ray Division of General Electric Corporation in San Francisco. He was trained to repair electrical appliances, X-Ray machines and duplicating machines. He is now working in the Maintenance and Operations Division of the Public Works Department.

He graduated from the Utulei campus of the High School of American Samoa in July 1965.

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POWELL MANEUVERING STARTS

WASHINGTON, (UPI) - Legal maneuverings in the Adam Clayton Powell case are under way. Attorneys for the Harlem Democrat have filed suit in federal court demanding that he be restored to the House seat from which he was ousted March 1.

They asked a federal judge in Washington to immediately empanel a three-judge court to hear their case, and that the panel declare the House action "excluding," or barring Powell from membership unconstitutional.

Powell's lawyers are hoping to get a ruling or a hearing today from the judge assigned to determine whether the special panel should be created.

Powell himself began his reelection campaign with a Bimini news conference in which he heaped scorn on his announced Republican opponent, James Meredith. Powell also won endorsement from the Congress of Racial Equality as the new hero of the civil rights movement.

Meanwhile, in Grand Rapids, Michigan, Meredith said that Powell was expelled on emotional racism and that his reelection would be a political disservice to the country.

U.S. WEATHER OUTLOOK BRIGHTENS

A marked and much welcome warming trend is sweeping across the United States.

Temperatures are on the rise toward mild levels from the Southwest across the Central States to the East.

However, contrast existed the northeast where some leftover arctic air chilled much of New England. Burlington, Vermont posted a record low for the date of 11 below.

And in the Pacific Northwest, gusty winds are carrying cold rain or snow inland with locally heavy snowfalls likely at higher elevations. Motorists and stockmen warnings have been issued for heavy snow in the Montana mountains.

Light snow or flurries linger from the eastern Great Lakes to the Central Appalachians. But this activity is gradually coming to an end.

GM THREATENS TO CLOSE PLANT

MICHIGAN, (UPI) - General Motors has threatened to close its vital Mansfield, Ohio, parts factory, the scene of three wildcat strikes in less than a month. GM said the conduct of leaders of the United Auto Workers Union local has posed the question as to whether or not the continuation of the plant is practical or possible. Ninety per cent of GM's nationwide production depends on parts produced at the plant.

Sheriff's deputies are patrolling the Mansfield plant where 1700 members of a 2700 union members have vowed to continue a wildcat walkout.

The strike -- in defiance of the UAW executive board -- threatens to cripple the world's largest car maker.

The union executive board took control of the rebellious union late yesterday after meeting with the local's leaders. But last night the members voted to continue their strike despite the executive board's nearly unprecedented disciplinary action.

Only 61 of the 250 workers on the early morning shift reported for work this morning.

A continuation of the strike could force GM to shut down its auto producing facilities across the country. A strike at the plant last month forced GM to lay off nearly 200,000 workers.

MCKINLEY CONQUERED IN WINTER

ANCHORAGE, Alaska. (UPI) - Three Alaskans have become the first to conquer North America's highest mountain -- Mount McKinley -- in the wintertime.

The three: Ray Genet, Dave Johnson and art Davison, all of Anchorage encountered trouble. Storms swept the 20,320-foot peak and cut the men off from the outside world. They huddled in snow houses for several days until yesterday. Bush pilot Don Sheldon of nearby Talkeetna defied howling winds, snow and clouds to land his helicopter and rescue the three conquerors and two other climbing partners.

But, there were seven men in the team. The other four are unaccounted for and a search continues for them.

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
