ASO TOFI, MATI 30, 1967UNDERSECRETARY OF INTERIOR RESIGNS

NEW YORK CITY (UPI) - Undersecretary of the Interior Charles F. Luce will resign from government service this summer to take over as chairman of Consolidated Edison.

Consolidated Edison is the largest electric power company in New York City.

The announcement that Luce will head up the multi-million-dollar power company was made by Consolidated Edison.

The company said that Luce will remain with the government until he receives his assignments from Consolidated Edison.

Luce is a native of Plattsville, Wisconsin and has been a career man in U.S. government service since 1942. The 49-year-old Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Wisconsin was administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration in Idaho prior to becoming undersecretary of interior.

The undersecretary is second in command of the Department of Interior to Secretary Stewart Udall.

There was no immediate word from Washington, D.C., as to a successor to Luce, who has been a lawyer since 1941.

HAWAII'S ETV SYSTEM TO BE EXPANDED

HONOLULU -- The Hawaii Educational Television System is planning to expand its coverage to the island of Kauai, which is the only major Hawaiian island that does not now receive ETV programming.

Dr. Donald Wood, director of educational television for the State Department of Education, said a federal grant of \$159,000 will make the expansion of the network possible.

KHET-TV has its studios on the campus of the University of Hawaii. It features daytime programs for students and teachers, and evening programs for the family.

Most of Oahu, Molokai, Maui and Hawaii already receive KHET-TV broadcasts.

TWO HAWAII AIRLINES BID FOR CONTRACT SERVICE

HONOLULU -- Aloha and Hawaiian Airlines announced today they will file bids for scheduled contract service between the islands of the Pacific Trust Territory and Guam.

The Interior Department has invited airlines to submit bids for the new service. Presently, air service in this area is handled by Pan American World Airways. However, one Pan-Am contract expires December 31.

An Aloha spokesman said that airline, along with Continental Airlines and the United Micronesia Development Association will submit a joint bid in the near future.

Jack Tobin, executive vice president of Hawaiian, said that airline also will submit a bid shortly. Tobin said Hawaiian has been trying to get a contract for Micronesia for the past 18 months.
