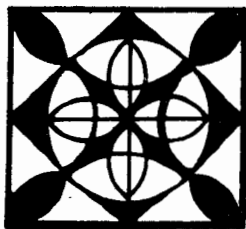

ISRAEL CALLS FOR PEACE AS VICTORIOUS TROOPS ROLL ON

JERUSALEM (UPI) -- Israel has called for peace in the Middle East. The Israel peace call came after Israeli military units rolled through Arab forces in Egypt and Jordan. Israel said it would not give up the captured Jordanian city of old Jerusalem.

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The United Nations Security Council has adopted a Russian proposal calling on all combatants in the Middle East war to stop fighting. The 15-nation council passed the draft resolution without debate. In presenting the proposal, Soviet Ambassador Fedorenko warned that unless a ceasefire is immediately effected the situation in the area would be "even more menacing."

Before the council convened in emergency session, the Soviet Union warned Israel it might break off diplomatic relations unless Israel halted its "aggression" against the Arabs. Fedorenko condemned Israel for, what he called, "completely unjustified aggression" against the Arabs.

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Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan told a news conference in Jerusalem, and these are his words; "At this crucial hour we earnestly stretch our hands to our Arab brethren in peace."

"But," Dayan continued, "We have returned to Jerusalem never to part from her again."

Dayan, who led Israel in the Suez campaign in 1956, said: "This war was not of our making."

The general held his news conference within hours after Israeli forces smashed into Egypt and Jordan.

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Israeli forces seized the heights of Sharm El-Sheikh, overlooking the straight of Tiran, ending the Arab blockade of the Gulf of Aqaba.

Israeli armored columns were reported on the banks of the Suez Canal after crashing through Egyptian defenses in the Sinai defenses.

The Israeli Chief of Staff, Major General Yitzhak Rabin said in Jerusalem that the main body of the Egyptian army in the Sinai had been crushed.

Rabin was unable to confirm the report that Israeli troops were at the Suez. All he would say officially was that they were 21 miles away and "dealing" with Egyptian rear guards fleeing toward the waterway.

Official sources in Cairo said the United Arab Republic has rejected the U.N. Security Council's first call for a ceasefire. The sources said Egypt rejected the demand by continuing to fight and by not making any official reply to the U.N. plea.

Two more nations, Lebanon and Mauritania, have added their names to the growing list of nations that have broken off diplomatic relations with the United States. They joined six other countries that have severed diplomatic ties with the U.S.

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Amman Radio said Jordan has accepted the U.N. cease fire appeal. The broadcast said the nation's premier has already notified the U.N. of the decision. If correct, this is the first crack in the United Arab front and the first acceptance of the cease fire.

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Military experts in Washington credit Israel's major gains to her lightning swift assumption of air superiority and closely coordinated ground tactics.

Conversely, it appeared that the Arabs have failed not only to coordinate offensive action, but even have neglected to get together on defensive tactics. This is so despite the fact that they outnumber the Israelis two-to-one.

Israel's strategy appeared to be to seize as much Arab territory as it can to strengthen its hand at an eventual peace table.

The U.S. administration is making emergency plans to prevent a free world oil shortage stemming from the refusal of other Arab nations to supply oil to Western powers.

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Goldberg fumed at Egyptian charges that U.S. and British aircraft have helped Israel in the battle.

Echoing the earlier denial of Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Goldberg called them fantastic allegations, and denied them, "without any ifs, ands or buts."

At the same time, he dramatically announced that the United States is prepared to cooperate in an immediate impartial investigation of the charges. The U.S. invited U.N. personnel to come aboard aircraft carriers of the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean at their earliest convenience to verify the activities of U.S. planes. Britain also denounced the Arab accusations that British planes had participated in the hostilities on Israel's side.

Significantly, Fedorenko failed to mention the Arab intervention charges, something diplomats took as deflating Egypt's charges against the U.S. and Britain.

LBJ ANNOUNCES FORMATION OF COMMITTEE TO BUILD NEW MIDEAST PEACE

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Johnson announced the creation of a top level U.S. government committee "to help build a new peace" in the Mideast after the present fighting ends.

Mr. Johnson issued a statement after meeting with the National Security Council. He said McGeorge Bundy, his former special assistant, will take a temporary leave as head of the Ford Foundation to be executive secretary of the special committee.

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Meanwhile, Vice President Hubert Humphrey, briefly referring to the Middle East crisis today, said Americans must dedicate themselves to asserting, as well as protecting man's rights in the 21st century.

In an address prepared for delivery at the U.S. Naval Academy commencement, Humphrey said the rights of modern man are affected by forces even beyond his own government. He suggested there be a "new bill of rights" for the 21st century to fit the new times and circumstances.

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
