MISSING KOREAN FISHING BOAT RETURNS SAFELY

A Korean fishing boat which had been reported missing in mid-May returned to Pago Pago Harbor Saturday night.

The vessel's only problem was just what local officials had hoped it would be -- a defective radio.

The Nam Hae No. 227, owned by the Korean Marine Industrial Development Corp. (KMIDC) arrived at the Star Kist dock at about 9 p.m. Saturday. Its crew of 24 was in good condition. The boat brought in a catch of about 55 tons of fish.

The Nam Hae No. 227 was reported missing May 16 after a Korean "control" boat reported that it had not had an routine radio messages from it since April 12 when it was in rough waters east of Rarotonga and southwest of Tahiti.

KMIDC officials asked the Government of American Samoa to dispatch radio descriptions of the vessel to various South Pacific islands and to search and rescue agencies.

Officials of that firm and Star Kist today thanked the Government for its aid.

SAMOAN MARINE DIES IN VIET NAM

Corporal Pelesasa F. Tauanu'u was killed in action in Viet Nam May 25, the Marine Corps has notified his father Solomona Tauanu'u of Fagasa.

The notice of his death said he was hit by sniper fire near Quang Tri.

Tauanu'u is the ninth Samoan to die in the Viet Nam conflict. Thirty three local men have been listed as casualties.

HOSPITAL MOVE GOING SMOOTHLY

The old Hospital of American Samoa was being slowly closed down today as the new Lyndon B. Johnson Tropical Medical Center was being opened.

Hospital Administrator Dick Warren said the move was going very smoothly.

A switchboard at the new hospital had been opened and checks were being run on equipment which already has been installed. The hospital staff began issuing furniture.

Warren said preliminary work should be completed tomorrow in time for the big move Wednesday when 10 trucks from the Department of Public Works will begin shuttling furniture and equipment from the old hospital to the new. Patients also will be moved Wednesday.

Warren said the public was cooperating in the move by not reporting for out-patient care of for pre-natal appointments. Everyone had been requested to wait for treatment of outine illnesses until out-patient service can be resumed at the new hospital.

Emergency treatment being given anyone who is seriously ill or anyone who is injured at the old hospital.

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TRUST ISLANDS RECEIVE AID

The U.S. Government is providing house building materials for people of Saipan, Tinian and the Northern Marianas who were made homeless by Typhoon Jean.

High Commissioner William R. Norwood completed arrangements for the program with the Office of Emergency Planning. The plan requires the typhoon victims to exhaust their own resources before becoming eligible to receive the material. They also are required to clear debris, prepare fittings and erect the emergency homes from pre-cut equipment which will be in at least two sizes, depending on the number in the family involved.

J.F. Screen, acting deputy high commissioner, announced details of the plan.
