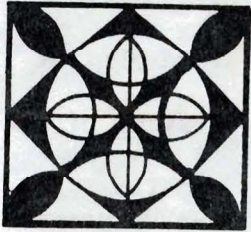

The mged little vessel ended its six-week trip from New Orleans as she tied up at the dock at Port Administration to the cheers of a large group of families and friends of the crew.

Sunday Captain John Calver radioed Port Administrator Fred Uhrle that he would make port at 10 a.m. today and he made good on his estimate to the minute.

AMERICAN SAMOAN AIRMAN WINS HONOR

Sergeant Moreli Niutoa Jr. of Olosega, Manuatele, American Samoa has been named Outstanding Non-Commissioned Officer for the month of May at Adair Air Force Station in Corvallis, Oregon.

He received a grade of 100 per cent and is the first American Samoan to win this honor. He was graded on military bearing, appearance, quantity and quality of work and knowledge of current events, history and geography.

At the same time he was judged the Outstanding Communicator for the 26th Air Division.

He received letters of commendation from several commanding officers of the division.
