

Port Is Busy

Cruise ships and their passengers are flocking to American Samoa -- and it couldn't happen to a more beautiful place.

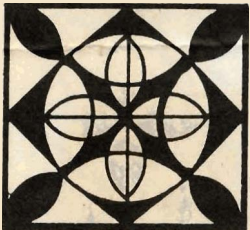
When the Southern Cross tied up in Pago Pago this morning, she became the second of five cruise ships which will visit the territory during the last two weeks of January. Their passenger capacity totals more than 5,000 tourists.

The Southern Cross, which will remain in port overnight, has a capacity of 1,160 passengers. It arrived less than 36 hours after the departure of the President Wilson, with a capacity of 550.

The smaller luxury cruiser West Star makes one of its frequent stops next Sunday, to be followed by two large passenger ships later in the week. The 1,400-passenger Arcadia will be in port Wednesday, and the 1,600-passenger Oronsay ties up early Thursday for an overnight stay.

However, cruise ships aren't the only vessels keeping Port Administration officials busy. Other arrivals scheduled for January include: 20th -- An Yung #3. 21st -- Tai Yung #2. 22nd -- Taveuni. 25th -- Sonoma. 28th -- Graziella Zeta. 30th -- Chevron Leige.

Fuimaono Leaves

Delegate A. U. Fuimaono and his family left yesterday afternoon for Washington where he will be the territory's first representative in the national capital.

A huge and colorful crowd, headed by Governor and Mrs. John M. Haydon and members of the Legislature, was at the airport to take part in one of the largest farewell ceremonies ever held locally.

Fuimaono, former director of the Department of Agriculture, won the post last November in the first territory-wide election which drew a field of five candidates.

Fuimaono said that he planned to spend two days in Honolulu conferring with officials there. He was to meet with officials in the College of Tropical Agriculture in the University of Hawaii and discuss a number of farming programs launched here while he was director. He was to ask that assistance from the university for these program be continued.

VEHICLE INSPECTION DEADLINE NEARS

Owners of motor vehicles were reminded today that the deadline for securing inspection stickers for 1971 is January 29 and that it will be illegal to drive without one after January 31. Vehicle owners should go to the Revenue Division and pay a \$1 fee for a receipt which they should take to the motor pool where they will be issued a form which will authorize the Revenue Division to issue the sticker.

WORK TO BEGIN ON TEMPORARY FONQ QUARTERS

The Department of Public Works today issued a work order for the conversion of the present office of the Attorney General and Immigration Officer into temporary quarters for the Legislature.

Crews are now at work completing new offices for the Attorney General and Immigration Officer in the Administration Building in Utulei.

The work on the Legislature's quarters will be completed in time for the opening of the next session on February 8. The Legislature will hold pre-session meetings in the Courthouse.

ADULT EDUCATION COURSE IN TROPICAL AGRICULTURAL OFFERED

NEWS BRIEFS

QUITO, Ecuador (UPI) - The ninth American fishing boat in eight days has been seized by the Ecuadorian navy. The U. S. vessel was nabbed for fishing within the 200-mile territorial limits Ecuador claims off its Pacific coast. The U. S. recognizes only a 12-mile territorial limit for fishing.

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Residents in Los Angeles were warned it wasn't safe to breath yesterday. At least not outdoors.

The temperature was 92 degrees, but Los Angeles residents who went outdoors to enjoy it also found dangerous amounts of carbon monoxide in the air. It was the second day in a row that an air pollution alert was in effect in Los Angeles. Motorists were urged not to use their cars.
