## Secondary Students Register Monday

Registration of secondary school students for the coming school year will be held Monday and students are required to be at their registration station by noon.

The old Samoana School District has been split into two districts, giving the territory four districts as follows:

\* Eastern District High School at Fagaitua (Atu'u eastward, including Vatia and Afono).

\* Samoana High School at Utulei, Satala to Faganeana, including Asu and Fagasa).

\* Leone High School at Leone (unchanged).

\* Manu'a Tele High School on Ta'u (unchanged).

Students must attend the high school in their district unless they are taking Skills Training, Advance Typing or the Accelerated Program. Students in those groups must attend Samoana High School.

All Manu'a students will register at Manu'a Tele and Leone students at Leone High School. Samoana students will register in Buildings B and C and Eastern District students will register in Building A at Samoana High School.

Each student must bring \$5 as a registration fee and a pen or pencil. All students who are enrolling for the first time (ninth graders and new students) must bring their birth certificates. New students above the ninth grade must bring their past high school records.

Teachers must report at 7 a.m. to their respective schools. The faculty of Eastern District High School should report to Building A, Samoana High School.

### MANU'A VOTERS MAY REGISTER HERE

Manu'a voters who are living on Tutuila may register to vote at the Office of Tourism, Election Commissioner Fofō I. F. Sunia said today. He also announced that a registration desk will operate in the market place from next Monday through Friday.

He said Vaigalu Tupulua of Aoloau has withdrawn his candidacy for representative in the 17th District. He also said he had approved the petition for candidacy in District 6 for Faigata Igafo.

Governor Owen S. Spinnall today named Manuel A. Velasco of the Attorney General's Office to the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for a two-year term. He will replace Frank Swett.

NIXON TAKES CAMPAIGN TO TEXAS

HOUSTON (UPI) - Richard Nixon invaded Lyndon Johnson's Texas today after getting receptions by big crowds in Chicago and San Francisco.

The former Republican Vice President will visit the Space Administration moonshot headquarters in Houston and address the party faithful at an outdoor rally this evening.

In Washington, sources close to Vice President Humphrey said President Johnson has offered to do whatever he can for the Humphrey campaign. Humphrey's aides say the President's help will be most welcome in Texas and the Southwest.

Humphrey meanwhile, issued his first blast at Nixon, even before the formal start of the Democratic Presidential campaign, set for Monday. Dismissing a suggestion that Nixon is better able to achieve peace in Viet Nam, Humphrey labelled the Republican candidate "a Cold War warrior." Humphrey said he's still hopeful the present administration can end the war.

POLL SHOWS WAR TOP POLITICAL ISSUE

NEW YORK (UPI) - According to a recent poll by a market research firm on the issues of the Presidential campaign, nearly two out of three voters asked believe the next President's Number One problem will be Viet Nam.

Next in line, according to a Sindlinger and Company telephone poll of 1,800 voters, is concern about civil rights and urban violence.

SENATE RESTORES SCHOOL FUNDS

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Senate voted today to restore almost \$91 million for aid to school districts which have large numbers of children of federal employees enrolled.

The Senate voted to restore the funds twice previously, but the administration decided not to spend the money as part of a \$6 billion spending cut called for in Congress. The third vote to restore the funds came today despite charges the Congress is "whittling away" at its own spending cut.

U.S. DROPS CULTURAL TIES WITH POLAND

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The United States today cancelled its cultural exchange with Poland. State Department Spokesman Robert McCloskey said in Washington the U.S. cancelled the programs to show displeasure over Polish support of the Russian invasion of Czechoslovakia. The action comes after similar cut-backs in cultural agreements with the Soviet Union.

LBJ MAKES NEW BID FOR APPROVAL OF FORTAS

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Johnson went to bat again today for the nomination of Abe Fortas to be chief justice of the United States.

Mr. Johnson said the Senate should not allow a "little sectional group" to bar the confirmation of Fortas.

He told a news conference that he still is hopeful the nomination of Fortas and Homer Thornberry to be associate justice will be approved before the Senate ends its session.

Mr. Johnson called the news conference after meeting for several hours with Secretary of State Rusk, Senate Democratic Leader Mansfield and Senate GOP Leader Dirksen. He said he had discussed the Fortas nomination with the two leaders. The President said he reminded them that there "has never been a single case when the Senate failed to act on a nomination because of a filibuster."

The President told the newsmen his head count in the Senate shows a majority supports the two nominations. Therefore, he declared, the Senate "shouldn't allow a little sectional group, through parliamentary tricks, to stop the will of the majority."

## RAY'S DISMISSAL PLEA DENIED

MEMPHIS (UPI) - A Memphis judge today refused to dismiss a murder indictment against James Earl Ray, the accused slayer of Dr. Martin Luther King.

Ray's lawyer, Arthur Hanes, said the publicity Ray has received makes it impossible for him to receive a fair trial anywhere in the nation. Hanes also wanted a weapons charge dropped against his client.

Criminal Court Judge W. Preston Battle will rule later today on another defense request to allow Ray's lawyers to examine the prosecution's witnesses and evidence.

## APOLLO TEST SUCCESSFUL

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) - The rerun of the Apollo Seven simulated launch here proved a success. The test was rescheduled yesterday to double check the spacecraft's fitness for launch after power failures Wednesday. A NASA spokesman said the fleeting power losses originated in ground batteries and were not a symptom of moonship troubles.
