## Samoan Village Leases Due Friday

The Parks and Recreation Board will meet at 1 p.m. Friday to select persons, groups or families who will be given leases in Pago Pago Park to build fales in the Samoan Village.

Governor Owen S. Aspinall today urged that all interested parties submit written requests to Lieutenant Governor M. A. Mangnall before the deadline. Mangnall said several requests already have been received.

He said that acreage in the park is going to be offered for use as botanical gardens by the Korean, Japanese and Chinese fishing fleets so their countries will be represented.

Western District Governor A. U. Fuimano will appear on the television newscasts Wednesday night to show drawings of the proposed village.

The Government of American Samoa will issue 10-year leases at a nominal charge to the persons selected. The primary purpose of the project, the Governor said, is to enhance the beauty of the park, perpetuate Samoan culture and create a light industry which will include the manufacture of handicraft items to sale to visitors.

Persons obtaining the leases must begin work on their fales in 30 days. The village should be completed in three or four months.

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### HISTORICAL SITE SELECTIONS MADE

Seven locations have been selected as historical sites on Tutuila and will be listed in the revised list by the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation of the Department of Interior.

Lieutenant Governor A.R. Mangnall said today that additional sites still will be added to the list and urged anyone knowing of others to contact his office.

Here are the ones selected to date: The shark and turtle site at Vaitogi, Pola Island, the red quicksands of Aunu'u, Massacre Bay at Asu village, Blunt's Point, Virgin Falls and Saua.

ISRAEL REPORTED TIGHTENING DEFENSES

JERUSALEM (UPI) - Israel was reported to have built up front-line defenses with Soviet-made, 155-millimeter howitzers and other weapons captured from Arab armies in the six-day war last year.

All was reported quiet along the Suez Canal but Israeli and Jordanian forces clashed on the western front yesterday.

Israeli spokesmen said Jordanians infiltrated inside Israeli territory last night near Mishar. Three Israeli civilian watchmen were killed with hand grenades and sub-machineguns. Jordan in turn reported Israeli gunners fired a 10-minute artillery barrage between Lake Tiberias and the Dead Sea.

COMMIES LOSE

STOCKHOLM (UPI) - Sweden's ruling Social Democratic party, which has held power for more than 36 years, won its greatest election victory since the war in yesterday's elections.

IN SWEDEN

Observers believed the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia dealt a possibly fatal blow to the small Swedish Communist party. More Swedes than ever before cast ballots and for the first time in history Sweden has a one-party government with an absolute majority in both chambers of parliament.

RED SPY SHIP

HONOLULU (UPI) - The Russian intelligence ship Gavril Saritchev sits about 12 miles off Diamond Head in international waters, while a United States Destroyer escort, the Charles Berry watches her every move. The Navy said the Soviet ship has "every right to be there" but will be kept under 24-hour surveillance while it is near Hawaii. The Saritchev, according to the Navy approached Honolulu more than a week ago.

EYES HAWAIISTUDENT UNRESTEXPECTED IN PARIS

PARIS (UPI) - French government officials and students faced a possible major show-down today, when several universities and most grammar and high schools began classes for the fall term. Many examinations postponed during violent student uprisings last May and June

Students already have scheduled protest demonstrations at the Paris medical and law schools. Officials fear that trouble in Paris could spread quickly to other areas, as it did in the previous rebellion.

VIET OFFENSIVEPLANS ATTACKED

SAIGON (UPI) - Allied troops working to break up Communist plans for another nationwide offensive have killed at least 100 guerrillas in fights around Saigon. The allies also captured a rocket-launcher aimed at the city and raked in a record haul of munitions.

In fighting around Da Nang and at other points, at least 284 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese regulars were killed.

NATO MEMBERSSTAGE WAR GAMES

BRUSSELS (UPI) - Nine NATO allies including the United States have begun a big naval war game in the North Atlantic.

NATO headquarters here described the exercise as part of a "regular series." More than 100 ships and planes are taking part.

SOVIET PAPERSEES CZECH PROGRESS

PRAGUE (UPI) - The Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda today cautiously approved the progress in Czechoslovakia toward a Moscow-dictated "normalization," including tough censorship laws. But Pravda's writers probably have not seen today's issue of Rude Pravo, the Communist party organ in Czechoslovakia. It carries a defiant justification of the policies of Deputy Premier Ota Sik, architect of Czech economic reform and one of the men most hated by the Kremlin.

EXPENSIVE COFFEE

NIAGARA FALLS, New York (UPI) - Anthony Costanzo, Jr., left home years ago to make his fortune in Florida. Yesterday, he came back home to Niagara Falls with \$40,000 hidden in a guitar case from the sale of his restaurant in Fort Lauderdale. Costanzo stopped for a cup of coffee. But when he returned to his car, thieves had stolen the guitar case, and with it his entire fortune.

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
